## NLYH APPROVED PLANTING GUIDE

Ornamental annual flowers may be the resident's choice.

PRIOR APPROVAL of all plantings below must be submitted to the Corporate Board by a drawing showing the type and location of the planting.

**POTS – All pots must have a paver or solid pot disk underneath  
All pots must be put inside when leaving during hurricane season.  
(See General Rule II.23 and II.23a.)**

All plantings must be kept trimmed and looking healthy.

### **Only the following list are permitted to be planted in NLYH**

#### GROUND COVER:

DWF Mexican Heather (must be kept trimmed)  
Liriope (Variegated or Green)  
Society Garlic (**Strong – Garlic Smell**)  
Blue Daze  
Wax Jasmine

#### VINES:

Mandavilla  
Allamanda  
Confederate Jasmine  
Trumpet (yellow, pink)  
Thunbergia Fragrans  
Flame Vine

#### SHRUBS/BUSHES:

Ti (Cordyline Terminals) brown leaves must be pulled year round and kept trimmed.  
Gold Mound Skyflower (Durenta Gold Mound)  
Today Yesterday and Tomorrow (**Great Colors**)  
Foxtail Fern  
Bromeliad (Varieties)  
DWF Ixora  
DWF Hibiscus (this will be big in two years)  
Allamanda Bush

Mexican Petunia (must be kept trimmed)

**MULCHING MATERIAL** - The Corporation discourages residents from using lava rock as a mulch or ground cover. Lava rock is so light it floats in water. This feature causes problems during the rainy season when heavy rain washes the rock into neighboring yards and canals. Some other mulches are easily moved by the rain or sprinkler systems. The Corporation recommends the use of Cyprus wood mulch. It is more likely to stay in place. A dark plastic ground cover used before mulching will keep the weeds out.
